Epsilon Chapter is partnering with the Silver City Women's Society and the Lion's Club to do vision testing for children from Headstart to 1st grade. The area for screening will include Silver City, Bayard, Cliff, Lordsburg, and Animas.

Brenda Dunn, Program Manager of NM Operation Kid Sight, Inc, presented the training. As educators, we know the importance of early vision testing for the child's optimum learning experience. However, Brenda stressed the importance of this screening for the detection of "lazy eye." What happens if amblyopia goes untreated?

"If not treated early enough, an amblyopic eye may never develop good vision and may even become functionally blind." Check out this article at https://www.preventblindness.org/amblyopia-lazy-eye

Brenda asked us if we had chapters statewide. I told her that we were an international organization. Brenda is looking for a group that is willing to do testing statewide. Her office is located in Las Cruces, however she told us if we didn't have anyone to take a school she would drive over here and do it herself. Her dedication and desire to test as many children as possible is obvious.

Apparently, parent approval is no longer required for the screening. After the screening, the nurse keeps a copy of the results (if the child does not pass), and the parents are notified. The Lion's Club has programs to help with the expenses of exam and glasses. They even have a "Spare Pair" program, so that students can keep an extra pair of glasses at school.

Epsilon Chapter feels this is an important community project, and we are very glad to help in this worthwhile endeavor.

Austin Recap

Key Women Educators from all over New Mexico traveled to Austin, Texas July 16th-20th to attend the 2018 International Convention the birthplace of Delta Kappa Gamma. We were greeted and welcomed to Texas by warm, friendly bluebonnet "sisters" and our own Nadyne Gartman, and Sue Cook now of Texas. The last time we met in Austin, Texas was 1932.

We assembled to vote, vote, and vote! We voted using an electronic voting device; which really saved time. Ninety six amendments were adopted, with only 18 not adopted. Those not adopted were C-1; C-7; C-11; C-41; C-48; Group III bundle 1; ISR 23 and 24; Group IV bundle 2.

Things of interest included:

- Name change not adopted
- Membership remains by invitation
- Initiation changed to induction
- Golden Gift Committee remains its own committee
- International Committees will continue to have representatives from five regions instead of proportionate representation
- International officer voting remains as it is
- Constitution can be amended every two years
- Membership dues will be aligned in time to the DKG fiscal year July 1st to June 30th

Wow! Terrific speakers inspired and motivated us Benjamin Zander and Nadia Lopez were really worth hearing. What a special treat for those teaching and those retired.

We had a new addition to our agenda "Global Awareness Forum" a collaboration of forum chairs that modeled we are Leading Women Educators Impacting Education Worldwide.

Dr. Gwen Simmons was awarded the International Achievement Award and honored by DKG at the Impacting Education Worldwide Luncheon.

Personal Growth and Development

Exercise? Are you kidding?!?

How can I make the time? Won't it take me from my family? I'd have to spend money to join a club, work around the club's schedule, buy special clothes, and exercise with people who are on a totally different level! However, in this article, I want to open your mind to the possibility of working through these impediments.

But first of all, did you know that being active rather than sedentary can prevent premature mortality; cardiovascular disease; coronary heart disease; Type 2 diabetes; some cancers, including: breast, colon, uterine, and lung cancers; hypertension; stroke; obesity; depression; osteoporosis; Alzheimer's; and dementia? (Darren, et. al. 2006), (Blair, et. al. 1996), (Reiner, et. al. 2013), (McKinney, et. al. 2016), (https://medlineplus.gov 2017), (Kwak, et. al. 2018)

Ok, now back to the possibility of working through what may be inhibiting you from exercise! Guess what? Simply taking a brisk walk for as little as 10-30 minutes a day can positively impact your life! (Chow, et. al. 2014), (Roh, et. al. 2013), (McKinney, et. al. 2016), (https://medlineplus.gov 2017), (Dohrn, et. al. 2018) And you can break that time into 10 minute increments! Walking can be on YOUR schedule. You can walk when it is convenient for you. Early in the morning, during a break, during lunch, right after work, and later in the evening are all good times for walking. Perhaps, you could make it a family routine or plan family hikes for weekends. It will be good for them, too! I found that my daughter really talked with me during walks. Your dog will certainly get health benefits, as well. You don't have to join a club or buy special clothes, except good walking shoes. If the weather is bad, you can go to Walmart and briskly walk through your list. Many people do their walking at the mall. My husband, a stroke survivor, walks around our house! And, my brother controls his Type 2 diabetes by walking 20 minutes a day in his neighborhood.

Now the good news is that sedentary people who become more active actually show the greatest health gains! (Darren, et. al. 2006), (McKinney, et. al. 2016)

Look at your life. Are there opportunities for movement? Teaching requires movement as we move from student to student or from standing to sitting on the floor. My activity level was so high working with kindergarteners that 2 miles of walking a day in retirement does not match that level! I used to dance and jump with my students or have races with them at recess. You don't have to jog for miles. A 30-40 second run or high intensity exercise can be beneficial. You can choose to use the stairs instead of the elevator. You can park your car further from your destination. What about housework or gardening? I'm sure that in looking at your day or week, you can see the potential for improving your health. Research has shown that it's worth it!

Membership Committee Appointed, Begins Work at Fall Meeting

A newly constituted Membership Committee is currently being appointed to support Theta State's efforts to maintain and grow membership.

Fifteen DKG members from across the state have been invited to serve on this committee, representing each of 13 local chapters. Pat Graff, Theta State Second Vice-President, is serving as the committee's chair.

This committee will work with initiatives started a year ago at the membership Summit, held in Albuquerque last September to address problems of membership recruiting and maintenance, as well as chapter support. In the past few years, five chapters have been lost and membership in Theta State DKG has declined over 20%.

"We are looking to develop programs and initiatives that will help chapters recruit and retain members, develop strong leadership opportunities within chapters and the state, and build strong activities that will help our members continue to be Leading Women Educators in New Mexico," Graff said.

Once the committee is finalized, it will have its first meeting during the Fall Meeting this November in Albuquerque. Most of the group's work will be done through email and electronic virtual meetings. A full committee list of members will be published in the next *Theta State News*.

More Membership Tips

Has your chapter developed a plan to meet our Theta State Membership Challenge?

At the summer Leadership Seminar, held in Hobbs this past June, each chapter was challenged to increase its membership by 10% from last year's numbers. This means each chapter will work to recruit one to four new members sometime during this school year. More details on this initiative are in the Summer 2018 *Theta State News*.

Yes, that is a challenge, but it is also very doable!

Here are a few more tips and suggestions for building membership in your local chapter. These ideas were generated by several different working groups on membership during last year's membership initiative work.

Invite a state legislator or other policy leader to speak to your chapter about important educational issues. Be strategic and invite this person AFTER this November's general election and NOT during the state legislative session (this year from mid-January until mid-March). Reach out and ask this person to share with your members.

Discuss as a chapter how you wish to approach the recent change in Delta Kappa Gamma International with regards to recruiting college students and making them associate members. All of the details of this initiative are still being ironed out at International, and decisions about whether to include college students in education are still left up to each chapter. However, be proactive as a chapter and talk about the relative merits and issues of adding this group to your chapter. More on this will come from International soon...

Offer a professional development workshop for teachers in your area on a topic of interest, using some of your chapter (or Theta State) resources. This can be an event targeted to a specific group of teachers, such as reading literacy activities, or one that might reach a broad spectrum, such as learning how to use the Internet to sell one's self-created teaching ideas and materials. Plan a useful but concise program, advertise it to teachers in your area, offer refreshments and door prizes, and be sure to pitch Delta Kappa Gamma to those who fit your chapter's membership requirements.

Honor local women educators who are currently candidates for National Board Certification and those who have achieved National Board Certified Teacher status. Host a reception or another event to recognize these women who are working to improve their teaching practice using the rigorous national standards for our profession. Need help finding out who these people are? Connect with the NM NBCT Network at www. nmnbctnetwork.com. Alpha Epsilon Chapter in the Four Corners hosted an event such as this last spring which was very successful!



Spread the word the Scholarship Committee will be accepting applications for the next scholarship year. Deadline to apply is March 15th!

Stewart has sponsored bills that passed both legislative chambers, including bills dealing with rape kit testing, court interpreters and more.




