Ring..... Ring..... Hello,



If you have not explored the new DKG website, we invite you to visit www.dkg.org. The new site offers the information and resources you need plus new features like

- access to your personal account and members-only resources,

The new site requires member log in for registering an event, DKG Store, some features and resources. You already have an account under your member ID number. This member ID number is your username. When prompted to sign in, use your six digit member ID number (on membership card or only first six digits of the seven digits on your publications labels) as your username and the default password - dkg2014society. Once logged in, you can change your password to a preferred password at any time in your account under My DKG. Your username cannot be changed and will always be your member ID number. The Communications & Publicity Committee has provided a step by step instructional video on how to update the My Account area under "videos" on the C & P Committee page.





Red Roses for Gamma!

Several members of Gamma Chapter are involved in leadership positions in the federal SEED grant for professional development which has been awarded to the ABQ Network To Transform Teaching (NT3). The first grant was a cooperative effort involving ABQ Public Schools, APS charter schools, and the ABQ Teachers Federation. It provided \$1.5 million to recruit and support National Board candidates and to build classroombased teacher leadership positions. The grant started in January 2014 and will finish in June 2016. Pat Graff, Gamma president, has served as the cocoordinator for this program. In addition, Gamma member Kat Graham has been working as the program's website manager, building the ABQ NT3 website at www.abqnationalboards.org.

In October, it was announced that the ABQ NT3 program will be expanded in a second round of the grant to continue recruiting and supporting National Board candidates and to build more classroom-based teacher leadership opportunities throughout the state! No firm amount for this second grant has been announced, but in the next year it will provide **\$700,000**+ for these activities.

Serving as the state coordinator for this new NM NT3 grant is **Pat Graff**. In addition, **Evelyn Sanchez**, Gamma vice-president, will work as her assistant, focusing on statewide outreach. This grant work has begun and will continue until June 2018. Currently, outreach partners in the state will include APS and its charters, Taos Municipal Schools, Santa Fe Public Schools, and a coalition of districts in the Four Corners: Farmington, Bloomfield, Aztec, and Central Consolidated District.
