Barbara Whiting Blesses Theta State

Barbara Whiting leading "Do Twice as Much in Half the Time" workshop



International Representative Barbara Whiting had lots of down-to-earth remarks at the Theta State Convention, but her suggestions at the "Do Twice as Much in Half the Time" workshop were especially meaningful. She asked if we would feel rich if we were promised \$86,400 every day, as long as we would spend it all that day. Then she reminded us that each of us has 86,400 seconds each day; whether we are rich depends on how we use that time. Here are a few of her suggestions:

- Subtract clutter, distractions, time wasters (have a plastic bin for stuff to give away).
- Add programs, planners, purpose.
- Multiply your expectations for yourself and others.
- Divide your time. Make sure you get the best part. Notice that the important part of tiME is ME.
- Keep things moving; stop trying to be perfect; just try to be better. Write things down in one place.
- Tell solicitors you don't donate over the phone.
- Move from quantity to quality.
- Store things where they are used.
- Some rules need to be broken, like "Don't put off till tomorrow what you can do today."
- Maximize every minute. If you try to do two things at once, you have to take 50% longer.
- "Finish what you start" is not always best.
- Don't schedule your day more than 80%.

She concluded by quoting Mark Twain, "Begin every day by eating an ugly frog. The rest of your day will be a breeze." In other words, do the hardest job first.

World Fellowship Report...

Several years ago, one of my co-teachers at Mosquero Schools and her family sponsored a high school student from one of the "break-away" countries that had previously been the U.S.S.P. The student



been the U.S.S.R. The student, Astin, spent a year with her host family in Mosquero. This young lady was extremely bright and very talented. Her future goal was to become a doctor like her father. Her mother did not work outside the home because unemployment was so high in their homeland; jobs were mostly given to men.

Astin's parents and extended family were able to pay for her first year of college. Because of the changes in the government and his political affiliation, her father lost his job. Astin was no longer able to attend college because she and her family had no way to pay for tuition and books.

Our church looked into the possibility of wiring her money so she could continue her education. The problem with this good intention was that, because of government red tape, she probably would not receive the money; or the government would take most of it.

This may be the plight of many young ladies all over the world who want to become teachers, as well. There were seventy-five applicants for World Fellowship money for 2013-2014. The Committee awarded \$100,200 to forty-three deserving women. They will be attending colleges and universities in the USA and Canada. Some of the women received an extension to their original Fellowship. More than 600 women in over 100 countries have benefited from this fund. I encourage my Delta Kappa Gamma sisters to make a donation to World Fellowship at each meeting! WE can make a difference in education worldwide.

More Reports from Theta State Committees

Bylaws Committee Report...

During the Hobbs Convention, the 2011-2013 Bylaws Committee presented revisions to the Theta State Standing Rules and additions to TS Bylaws for consideration at the Executive Board meeting and the General Session. Amendments to the recommended revisions were suggested by those in attendance at the General Session. They were discussed and approved during the General Session on Saturday. Several new ideas have been implemented which should be of interest to all members. All who attended the General Session were provided with printed copies of proposed changes/additions. The corrected revisions will be available on the Theta State Web Site when the committee receives minutes corrections from the convention meetings. Check the web site for complete corrected documents (Theta State Bylaws and Standing Rules) to be posted by late May or early June. The latest revisions/additions bring Theta State documents in alignment with the International Constitution and Standing Rules.

A newly revised Procedures Manual for state officers and committee chairmen has been posted on the state web site. Incoming officers and committee chairmen will find the manual helpful as they begin the 2013-2015 biennium.

The committee also revised a suggested Chapter Rules template and will include a suggestion sheet for chapter presidents to use as a guideline when reviewing their current chapter rules. All is set up to help keep chapter rules in line with recommendations from the International Constitution. Chapters will need to have a 2010 copy of the International Constitution and Standing Rules available from headquarters and a copy of the newly revised Theta State Bylaws and Standing Rules available soon from the TS Web Site when revisions, additions, or corrections to chapter rules are made.
