This plans to be an exciting convention—I can't wait! See you in Deming, April 25-27.



Are You "Hip" to Social Media?

Social media consists of many different sources; namely, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc. Millions of people stay in touch with others via these media. They can be an easy avenue of communication. Before the use of social media, many people lost touch with each other. Because of these and others, many have reconnected. Pictures can be easily uploaded or taken (in the case of Instagram). Websites can be "liked"; comments can be made; pictures "liked," etc. The possibilities seem almost endless. Social media can be a very useful tool in education as well. Connecting with someone across the country or the world is completely possible. Just think of the information your students could acquire from a person living in a location you were studying. Initially, it appears that social media is quite useful and harmless.

I am sure you have heard the expression "A Picture is Worth a Thousand Words." That can be a serious problem. Although pictures can be removed from a person's page or account, the pictures can always be retrieved. It is so important that we as educators realize this. We also need to educate our students on the seriousness of placing pictures on the internet via any avenue. Students need to be aware that future employers will be searching the internet and social media sites for information about them when they apply for jobs. Something they do today could still have an effect on their employability 10-20 years from now.

Pictures are not the only

worrisome aspect of social media. Anytime someone "likes" a comment, quote, picture or anything on another's Facebook page or post, they are tied to that particular link. Depending on their settings, their "like" might be broadcast to all of their "friends." For example, I once "liked" a link that a very good friend of mine had shared. Unbeknownst to me, that link was linked to another link. Needless to say, the latter link was something I considered to be inappropriate. My daughter called me and asked about it, or I would not have even known. I immediately "unliked" the link. Meanwhile, I don't know how many of my "friends" may have seen the "like" before I removed it. The lesson that I learned from this was to be very careful when "liking" any link.

Many school districts have



implemented their own social media policies for not only employees but students as well. Social

media training has become mandatory in many districts. We should all be aware of the rules in place. A general rule to follow is if in doubt, always ask before using any social media!



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Proposed Changes to TS Bylaws and Standing Rules for Consideration at 2014 State Convention in Deming

Proposed Changes to Theta State Bylaws —1-24-2014 ARTICLE VI. OFFICERS AND RELATED PERSONNEL

Section 1. The stated elected officers shall be president, first vice-president, second vice-president, recording secretary, and corresponding secretary. When apprentices are available for position of Treasurer, the President is strongly encouraged to make her recommendation to the Executive Board from the available apprentices. A treasurer is selected and approved by the State Executive Board.

Section 2. An editor, parliamentarian, and webmaster shall be appointed by the President. When apprentices are available for a Related Personnel position, the President is strongly encouraged to make her selection from the available apprentices.

Proposed Changes to Theta State Standing Rules—2-10-2014 SECTION 4. Theta State Apprenticeship Program for all Related Personnel Positions

- A. Common Requirements for Admission to the Program An applicant must
 - 1. be an active member of Theta State.
 - 2.be willing to use personal technology equipment for the position.
 - 3. have attended numerous State Executive Board/General Session meetings.
 - 4. understand the expectations for the position
 - 5. be willing to commit to a minimum 2 years of training with the understanding that the current treasurer/editor/parliamentarian can serve for eight years.
 - 6. submit a letter of interest detailing qualifications for the position, commitment and reason for applying for the apprenticeship.
 - 7.provide a letter of recommendation from the applicant's Theta State chapter president along with a letter of interest.
 - 8. must attend, whenever possible, meetings that the mentor is required to attend (including

GoToMeeting sessions).

- 9. work with associated Theta State entities along with the mentor (Finance Committee, Editorial Board, Executive Committee, etc.).
 10. utilize effective communication skills (e-mail, oral reporting, writing, timely responses).
 11. be willing to learn from the
- 11. be willing to learn from the mentor.
- 12. attend workshops offered for chapter counterparts and apprentice program workshops.13. provide a letter of resignation to the State President and the mentor, should she decide to leave the program.
- B. Apprenticeship Requirements
 - 1. Treasurer
 - a. meets the common requirements for a Theta State Apprenticeship Program b. is able to meet deadlines in a timely manner
 - c. is serving or has served as a Theta State chapter treasurer
 - d. is serving or has served on the Theta State Finance committee
 - e. must have a working knowledge of spreadsheet technology
 - 2. Editor
 - a. meets the common requirements for a Theta State Apprenticeship Program
 - b. is able to meet deadlines in a timely manner
 - c. is publisher of or has published a newsletter (chapter, community, or other organization, etc.) and provides a sample with letter of interest (electronic or hardcopy)
 - d. is proficient in at least one form of technology associated with publishing (Publisher, Word, Pagemaker, Adobe Acrobat, etc.)
 - e. exemplifies standard English conventions, journalistic-style writing skills, and editing skills
 - 3. Parliamentarian
 - a. meets the common requirements for a Theta State Apprenticeship Program
 - b. has experience as a parliamentarian (chapter, community, other organizations, etc.)

- c. is familiar with parliamentary procedure and Robert's Rules of Order
- d. is familiar with current Delta Kappa Gamma International, Theta State, and chapter documents (governing and non-governing)

C. Program Procedures

- 1. Advertisement of the program will appear in Theta State News February issue, announcing a workshop for interested members to be offered at the State Convention in April
- 2. A training session for current and prospective apprentices will be offered at each Leadership Development Seminar.
- 3. Letters of interest for any apprenticeship program are due (postmarked or time stamped) to the State President by July 1st.
- 4. The State President will electronically distribute all information to the Executive Committee for review prior to the August Executive Committee meeting.
- 5. The Executive Committee will screen all letters of interest and confirm those for approval at the Fall Executive Board meeting.
- 6. The State President will present the Executive Committee apprentice recommendations for approval at the Fall Executive Board meeting.
- 7. Apprenticeships will begin immediately upon Executive Board approval.
- 8. No more than two (2) apprentices for each related personnel position, who would be eligible for financial support while participating in the program, will be approved by the Executive Board.
- 9. Former apprentices, who leave the program after two (2) years, shall continue to be considered available apprentices for the positions for which they did their training.
- D. Program Oversight for Theta State
 - 1. The State President will appoint an ad hoc committee to oversee the function of the Apprentice Program
 - 2. Funding
 - a. The Ad Hoc Apprenticeship

Proposed Changes to Bylaws and Standing Rules, cont.

Program Committee will request that a budget line item be established by the Finance Committee to support the program's needs.

b. The Committee will request that three night's lodging (at \$30 per night) will be provided for each apprentice to attend Theta State meetings when travel is necessary for carrying out Society business.

SECTION 5. STATE COMMITTEE ORGANIZATION AND DUTIES

- I. Standing Committees; 1. Society Business; e. Bylaws Committee
- 4) The committee shall be responsible for sending updated copies of state Bylaws to the International Constitution Committee for approval. and the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission (PRC). Current and approved Bylaws must be kept in the Theta State safety deposit box. They are to be made available to the State of New Mexico as per Corporation regulations.




